Course Description

The course defines police authority and explains the responsibilities and constitutional restraints as enumerated in the Texas Constitution, United States Constitution, and Bill of Rights. The course outlines the laws of arrest and search and seizure developed through court decisions and describes the criminal and civil liability that results from improper acts and/or the failure to act. *This course is time-bound, structured and completed totally online.*
