Jumpstart Reading and Writing (INRW 0100) Online

Credit: 1 semester credit hour (1 hour lecture)

Course Description

Integration of critical reading and academic writing skills. This class must be taken concurrently with ENGL 1301, and also integrates your ENGL 1301 materials and assignments into its Course Schedule and Reading and Writing Assignments. The intervention fulfills TSI requirements for reading and/or writing. *This course is time-bound, structured, and is completed totally online, and includes its own assignment due dates.*

- 4. Describe and apply insights gained from reading and writing a variety of texts.
- 5. Compose a variety of texts that demonstrate reading comprehension, clear focus, logical development of ideas, and use of appropriate language that advance the writer's purpose.
- 6. Determine and use effective approaches and rhetorical strategies for given reading and writing situations.
- 7. Generate ideas and gather information relevant to the topic and purpose, incorporating the ideas and words of other writers in student writing using established strategies.
- 8. Evaluate relevance and quality of ideas and information in recognizing, formulating, and developing a claim.
- 9. Develop and use effective reading and revision strategies to strengthen the writer's ability to compose college-level writing assignments.
