# Film Appreciation (COMM 2366)

Credit: 3 semester credit hours (3 hours lecture)

## Prerequisite/Co-requisite: None

**Course Description:** This course is an exploration of the history, methods, genres, and notable filmmakers in the cinematic arts, and the ways in which they express the values of cultures and human experience.

### **Learning Outcomes**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Understand works of film as expressions of individual and humanistic values within a historical and cultural context
- 2. Respond critically to works of film in the arts and humanities
- 3. Articulate an informed and personal reaction to films
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of the aesthetic principles and artistic contributions of a writers, directors, cinematographers, editors, actors, and set designers
- 5. Identify key developments in the evolution of film as an art form and understand the basic technical and artistic vocabulary of the film industry

### **Course Objectives**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to

- 1. Identify major genres within the cinematic arts.
- 2. Recognize the styles of major filmmakers within those genres.
- 3. Evaluate the impact of society on the history of film.
- 4. Become an active viewer of films and apply lessons within to one's everyday life.

### **Core Objectives**
