COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to provide you with defined goals and objectives of police authority. You will be able to demonstrate the ability to conduct proper criminal case investigations through the laws of arrest, search and seizure developed through court decisions. Throughout the course, you should acquire the knowledge of the "rule of law" through the U.S. Constitution, Bill of Rights and Code of Criminal Procedure. We will review how to organize a criminal case, including field notes, reports, and crime scene. In addition to this, students will define the responsibilities of Law Enforcement and Constitutional restraints. Students will analyze landmark Supreme Court cases that influences law enforcement. Demonstrate understanding of the daily functioning of the criminal justice system. Students will also be able to compare and contrast current Supreme Court cases to past Supreme Court cases. By the end of the course, Students will demonstrate the basic knowledge to prepare for a law enforcement career.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 8. Students will be able to compare and contrast current Supreme Court cases to past Supreme Court cases.
- 9. Students will discuss how do Law enforcement effects society.
