#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course is an exploration of the purpose and processes in the visual and performing arts (such as music, painting, architecture, drama, and dance) and the ways in which they express the values of cultures and human experience.

**Document Creation**: Regarding document creation and completion, in my experience, neither a tablet nor a smartphone is an acceptable replacement for a computer when it comes to document formatting. Be cautious if you are considering using such a device to complete lessons for this course as they usually cause more problems than they solve. It is your responsibility to ensure document formatting is accurate following a document upload to Blackboard. Also, I expect all documents to be in Microsoft Word format (NO exceptions!).

**Plagiarism:** Academic honesty is expected on all assignments. All work submitted must be your own work. Plagiarism must be avoided. This includes plagiarism of both published and unpublished information. All work submitted must be your own work. Clearly cite references when using another's ideas and use MLA 8TH edition format for referencing both in the body of a paper and in the reference

section. All work must be submitted to the Safe Assign program in Blackboard to be reviewed for plagiarism. Students who plagiarize (use the work of others without giving credit to the original author) will receive a grade of zero on the assignment.

**MLA Formatting**: Students must follow the formatting rules of MLA 8th edition to succeed in this course. Formatting includes: a cover page, headings, page numbers, in-text citations, and works cited. All written assignments must be typewritten on white 8.5x11 paper in 12-point Times New Roman font and double spaced. Also, I refer students to the OWL@purdue for all questions regarding MLA that have not been covered in other materials.

File Formats: All documents must be saved in one of the following file formats: .doc or .docx. I will not accept documents in any other format.

**Late Work:** I expect all assignments to be turned in on time, by 11:59 pm of the due date, usually Sunday, the last day of the weekly unit. Ideally, you should submit assignments early to avoid potential submission issues.

# No work can be submitted late without my approval:
