#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course is an exploration of the purposes and processes in the visual and performing arts (such as music, painting, architecture, drama, and dance) and the ways in which they express the values of cultures and human experience.

#### Communication

LIT email and Blackboard Announcements will be the instructor's primary methods for communication with students in the class. Emails will be sent to the student's email account listed in the Blackboard course. It is the student's responsibility to check their email account regularly or have it forwarded to an account they DO check regularly. Email responses will be made during regular office hours and occasionally outside of office hours, usually within two to three business days. Students may also schedule a meeting, in person or through Blackboard's Class Collaborate feature, during regular office hours or by appointment.

#### Grading

Submitted assignments will be graded during regular office hours, usually within five to seven business days. Assignments turned in on Thursday or Friday may not be graded until Tuesday or Wednesday of the next week. In the online-only, asynchronous course, students may work ahead of the course schedule. However, assignments turned in early will be graded as instructor work load permits.

Plagiarized work and work that has been generated with AI technology is not acceptable and will receive a grade of zero (0). **NO links** to Google documents or Microsoft shared files will be accepted for grading; assignments must be turned in/attached as PDF or Microsoft Word **files**.

Students can find the most accurate and up-to-date grades in Blackboard's gradebook; sometimes the grades in Blackboard are not always reflected in Starfish. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that all assignments are submitted in a timely manner; late submissions will be graded when all other regular assignments have been graded and posted.

#### Late work and Resubmissions

It is the student's responsibility to manage their time and make sure assignments, activities, and tests are submitted by the deadlines. Unsubmitted tests, quizzes, activities, and other assignments will be graded as zero (0) on the due date and will remain a zero until the assignment is submitted and graded. Assignment "drafts" will also be graded as a zero on the due date; Blackboard does not allow the instructor to view unsubmitted or draft assignments.

Quizzes, activities, and tests submitted late will be subject to a grade penalty of one letter grade per class day for unexcused absences. After 3 class days late, the assignment will receive a zero grade. It is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor if they are not able to complete assignments due to serious medical conditions or emergency situations AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. NO final essays or course assignments will be accepted after Sunday May 05, 2024 in order to accommodate grading and final grade entry.

Resubmissions may be accepted at the instructor's discretion for thoroughly REVISED, written regular assignments; the maximum grade for resubmitted assignments is 70% (C). Resubmissions must be turned in within 5 business days after the initial grade has been posted.
