I require you to download and use Respondus Lockdown Broswer to take your exams. I will email you the link to download Respondus well before the first exam and you are encouraged to download it right away so that you can address any problems before you take the first exam.

This is a college level course for adults and therefore adult behavior is expected. Each student comes to the class with a unique background and set of values and beliefs. I will grade assignments as they are submitted, usually within 48-72 hours of submission-this time frame may double for semester papers. All missing assignments will be given an automatic zero. It is my general policy not to allow extensions or makeups without significant, verifiable cause. Please do not contact me for an extension or a makeup for any assignment unless you are willing to provide documentation of a serious event that kept you from observing the due date and time. Due to the late due date and the time it takes to grade them, semester papers will not be accepted after the due date, for any reason. All grades are recorded in My Grades on Blackboard. All writing assignments must use correct academic style, grammar, punctuation, spelling, and usage, and APA formatting. It is the student's responsibility to know or learn what these requirements are.

Academic honesty is expected on all assignments. See LIT student handbook for more information about academic honesty and the penalty for violating academic honesty policies. Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, working with another student to complete tests or quizzes; submitting someone else's work, either published or not, as your own; using AI to write some or all of your papers; and using your own work from a previous class.
