#### PREREQUISITE/CO-REQUISITE:

A D or better in ENGL 1301 (Composition I).

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphasis on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions. This class is completely online.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to

1. Demonstrate knowledge of individual and collaborative research processes.

2. Develop ideas and synthesize primary and secondary sources within focused academic arguments, including one or more research-based essays.

3. Analyze, interpret, and evaluate a variety of texts for the ethical and logical uses of evidence.

4. Write in a style that clearly communicates meaning, builds credibility, and inspires belief or action.

5. Apply the conventions of style manuals for specific academic disciplines, APA, CMS, MLA, or other style manuals.

#### **REQUIRED TEXTBOOK AND MATERIALS**

*Literature, Critical Thinking, and Writing* The instructor will provide information for supplemental required reading resources.

#### ATTENDANCE POLICY

Attendance in this class, whether it is a face-to-face class or an online class, is based on both your physical or digital presence and your mental participation in my class, including interacting in class, in email, in the face-to-face unit assignments, and on the other assignments in this class. ### **MY TEACHING PHILOSPHY**

College level writing is much closer to workplace writing than it is to high school writing, in content, in tone, and in purpose. My purpose is to teach all students a writing process they can use whether they go on with their education, or go on with their chosen careers, after LIT. The writing process I teach also helps students improve their critical thinking skills by giving them plenty of opportunities to think critically about their own, and others, writing. I also believe that good editing is more important than good writing. All students are welcome to edit and resubmit their writing assignments by their due dates for higher grades.

### **MY RESPONSE TIME**

- 1. I only answer my phone when I am in my office.
- 2. I only return calls that leave a voicemail. I get a ton of robocalls to my office number.

## MY COURSE EVALUATION CATEGORIES

- 1. Final grades will be calculated according to the following criteria:
  - a. Participation/Attendance-10%
    - i. I use results to grade Participation/Attendance. These are the results based criteria I use:
      - 1. Online classes are based 50% on students' online engagement.
        - a. This may include everything from participating in one-onone email discussions to group discussion boards.
          - i. These happen weekly, and are based on reading assignments and writing assignments.
      - 2. Fifty percent, 50%, of the Participation/Attendance grade for online classes is based on the percentage of all assignments students' have submitted.
        - a. Students who submit 100% of all assignments will earn 50%. Any amount less than 100% will earn a lower percentage.
  - b. Daily Work Assignments--40%
    - i. An average of all essay proposal, outline, and research assignments.

- ii. See each assignment's grading rubric for more information.
- c. Mid-Term Exam—15%
  - i. Exam is 50% short answer and 50% short essay
- d. Research Paper—Common Assignment 15%
  - i. See each assignment's grading rubric for more information.
- e. Final Exam–20%. This is the Essay Final Exam assignment.

### **MY DUE DATE POLICIES**

- 1. All assignments have due dates.
  - a. strongly encourage students to submit their assignments before their due dates, so they can edit and resubmit their assignments to improve their grades.
  - b. Writing is a cyclical process, and you will find yourself editing one assignment and then having to edit either an earlier or later assignment at the same time.
- 2. If you miss a unit's final draft due date, you may continue working on that unit's assignments, but I will not grade them until the end of the semester.
  - a. Writing assignments submitted after their unit's final draft writing assignment due date will be graded the last two weeks of the semester.
  - b. They will be graded one time only with the grading rubric, and will not be marked or commented on.

## **MY GRADING POLICIES**

- 1. I grade assignments Monday through Friday during my office hours.
- 2. If your assignment has not been graded within 72 hours, email me and let me know it needs to be graded.
- 3. Assignments submitted before their due dates may be edited and resubmitted for a higher grade.
- 4. Missing assignments will be given a 0, which will be added to the Overall Grade calculation.
- 5. All grades are recorded in Gradebook on Blackboard.
- 6. It is the student's responsibility to make sure their grades on their assignments match their grades in Blackboard Gradebook.
- 7. If there is a discrepancy, email me the assignment title so I can correct it.
- 8. Grading rubrics are available on assignments.
- 9. I do not mark specific grammar, punctuation, spelling, usage, and style errors on writing
- 10. assignments.
- 11. I provide a list of writing errors that will lower students' writing assignments' grades.
- 12. Then together we discuss what you think are your grammar, punctuation, spelling, usage, and style errors during our face-to-face meetings, or in email.
- 13. We discuss what those errors are, how to identify them, and the best ways to correct them. This is a student-led discussion of their own writing.
- 14. Students are welcome to use editing software on their writing assignments. There are many good tools available free online; however, they don't recognize all the errors on my list of errors, especially academic style errors.
- 15. All assignments except for pretests and final exams have unlimited attempts.

- 16. All writing assignments must use correct academic style, grammar, punctuation, spelling, and usage, and MLA formatting.
- 17. All writing assignments' topics must be approved by me before you start your writing assignments.

### MY ACADEMIC HONESTY AND PLAGIARISM POLICIES

- 1. Academic honesty is expected on all assignments. See LIT student handbook for more information about academic honesty and the penalty for breaking academic honesty.
- 2. Plagiarism is submitting someone else's work, either published or not, as your own, and is not allowed.
- 3. Plagiarism includes everything from using AI to write your writing assignments; using your own work from a previous class, even if it was my class; patchworking sentences together from the internet; rewriting sentences from the internet; to using someone else's work.
- 4. All writing assignments are submitted to a plagiarism checker in Blackboard to be reviewed for plagiarism and AI composition, but this is not the only method I use to check for plagiarism and AI detection.

Students who plagiarize or use AI may receive a 0 on the assignment, a 0 on the entire unit, or may receive an F for the entire course.
